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# **GOLD COAST OR BUST**

Although a trip to the Gold Coast, is not an epic, in the Carrigg manner, members may pick up-the odd clue from the following account.

We travelled at 50 to 55 M.P.H., and averaged 30·3 miles to the gallon. No doubt a higher speed could have been maintained, but only at a sacrifice to fuel economy, and nervous energy, apart from knocking the car about somewhat. The fuel consumption was such, in spite of using a 55 size compensating jet, instead of the standard 50, in order to achieve greater power on hills. This may not apply to all Javelins but certainly makes a difference in mine.

I believe the best way to conserve fuel and oil, is to drive with a minimum of acceleration and deceleration, and have proved this personally on various trips in differing cars. We managed a high daily mileage, by getting away between 5 and 6 am and having breakfast on the way. I mention this because so many people hate rising early, and miss out on the best part of the day for travelling.

Befole leaving, I fitted two green Perspex sun screens, in place of the standard shields. They were made somewhat larger than normal, by Bellis Plastics, Caulfield, and were such an advantage, that we left them down most of the time. A sun visor of course would have served a similar purpose, but does cause wind drag, is more expensive and obstructs upward vision. Ever tried to see a town hall clock in a car equipped with a sun visor?

I also fitted two 1¼-in. by 20 SWG steel tubes through the sump, from front to rear, but had no time to fit funnels to the front of same, before leaving. Even so, the oil temp. never exceeded 70 degrees. Possibly a larger sized tubing would be much better, possibly with extractors fitted to the rear rather than funnels up front.

We carried 4 gallons of petrol and one each of oil, and water, as a precaution against loss by stone damage, luckily none was actually needed, but it does give a sense of security. Other spares worth having along are, fan belt, contact points, universal rubbers, and radiator hoses.

The highways between Melbourne and Brisbane, are mostly very good, and any member with a car in reasonable shape need have no qualms about such a trip. After all the same mileage would be achieved in local running on far worse roads without trouble, the coast roads, whilst being longer and somewhat twistier present much better views, and scenery, and are well worth the effort, although I think once is enough.
